Black Hawk College has a longstanding tradition of excellence. The Alumni Hall of Fame recognizes outstanding individuals for their professional and community service, including such notable graduates including United States Representative Lane Evans; United States Ambassador Richard Kauzlarich; Rose Vasquez, Diversity Analyst at Principal Financial Group; Robert Ontiveros, Chairman and Founder, Group O; Margarita Mojica, Co-Founder, One By One and nationally recognized Chad Pregracke, founder Living Lands and Waters.

ALUMNI HALL OF FAME

In 2019 four outstanding Black Hawk College alumni were inducted into the Alumni Hall of Fame. "These alumni all took diverse career paths yet each achieved exceptional accomplishments in their respective industries."

Rick McGrath of Moline, Dan McNeil of Moline, the late Alan Perley and Tim Stout both of East Moline joined the Black Hawk College Quad Cities Foundation Alumni Hall of Fame.

RICK MCGRATH *Class of 1977*

Rick was a member of Black Hawk College cross country and track teams; in 1975 the Cross Country team made it to NJCAA championship. Rick has run more than 50 marathons and all Quad Cities Marathons. In addition he has assisted with many races in the Quad Cities, including serving as the Quad City Times Bix7 Assistant Race Director.

Professional Rick worked for KJWW Engineering Consultants (now IMEG) for 40 years, retiring in 2017. He came out of retirement to work for ICC, Inc., another engineering consulting company. Contracted to the 3M facility in Cordova for 35 years in project manager/construction management position. Engineer of the Year Award from 3M, an award specifically for 3M employees—a notable achievement for a contractor to receive this award.

DAN MCNEIL *Class of 2005*

Dan was a program manager, fundraiser and executive director in the nonprofit sector for 14 years. He served as the executive director for Spring Forward Learning Center (SFLC) located in the Quad Cities. SFLC serves more than 600 children in after-school and summer enrichment camps. More than 90% of campers maintained or gained in reading level. Dan created a partnership with the Rock Island Futbol Club that engaged young athletes to learn the important lessons of teamwork, dedication and sportsmanship.

Dan's achievements include: 2017 Rock Island Citizen of the Year Award for Spring Forward Learning Center; and 2018 Bi-State Literacy Council Award. Community partner with RockTown Reads.

ALAN PERLEY *Class of 1980*

At the age of 16, Alan was Explorer Scout with Moline Police Department. After Black Hawk College graduation, he served on East Moline Police Department and Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department. Alan was awarded L.A. County Sheriff's Deputy of the Year, Lomita Station, in 1989. He has worked for several police departments in Chicago area and special agent for the U.S. government.

In addition, he served as patrol deputy, patrol officer, detective and group supervisor, Special Operations Unit and SWAT team leader, with numerous positions including field training deputy/officer and firearms coordinator.

Alan has provided principal bodyguard services for Tiger Woods (Tiger Woods Foundation), serving as personal, facility and bodyguard at nationwide foundation events. Alan has received more than 15 awards throughout his law enforcement career. He finished his career with Lake County (Illinois) Sheriff's Department in 2018.

TIM STOUT *Class of 1973*

At age 19, Tim was the director of 1972 Arrowhead Wheelchair games Track and Field meet at Black Hawk College. He was the first handicapped outreach recruiter-peer counselor at Black Hawk College. Tim's has been affiliated with the National Wheelchair Basketball Association as player, coach, official and administrator since 1968.

In addition, Tim has been a member of National Wheelchair Basketball Association Judicial Committee since 2010 and served as historian since 2013. He is also a member of NWBA Hall of Fame. Tim is a honored member of United Township High School Hall of Fame for 1969-70 boys basketball team and 1969 boys track team.

BLACK HAWK COLLEGE RECEIVES ONE MILLION DOLLAR GIFT FROM ALUMNI BOB & BLENDA ONTIVEROS

The donation comes to the college from the Bob and Blenda Ontiveros Fund at the Quad Cities Community Foundation. It is the largest monetary gift ever donated to the Black Hawk College Quad Cities Foundation.

“With this gift, the largest in the foundation’s history, we set a new course of giving students a hand up in pursuing their dreams at Black Hawk College,” said Tim Wynes, BHC president.

Maria Ontiveros spoke on behalf of her grandparents, quoting her grandfather, “Everyone wins when someone gets an opportunity,” she said. “We win because of the opportunities provided here at Black Hawk,” Ontiveros added. “I look forward to seeing how the seeds planted here today grow.”

The gift will be used to endow funding for a Student Services position dedicated to working with students from diverse backgrounds, and first-generation students from those backgrounds interested in entrepreneurship and business. The donation will also fund the creation of specific student scholarships. Additionally, the gift will allow the College to create a men’s and women’s soccer program and hire a coach-athletic student advisor (not endowed).

“As Black Hawk College alumni, they built their lives and careers in the Quad Cities—Bob in building Group O into a worldwide company and Blenda as a nurse,” Wynes said. He went on to add, “Bob and Blenda Ontiveros represent the best of the Quad Cities.”

BLACK HAWK COLLEGE FOUNDATION 5K HUSTLE RAISES MORE THAN \$6,000 FOR PTA SCHOLARSHIPS

RIBBON CUT FOR BUILDING 1 ADDITION, AND RENOVATION

In August of 2019, dozens of students, employees and members of the community gathered in the new courtyard at the Quad-Cities campus to celebrate the Building 1 addition and renovation. The \$17.8 million project began in March 2017 with renovations to the Enrollment Services, Financial Aid and Bursar's offices.

Ground was broken in March 2018 for the 20,000-square-foot, two-story addition that includes new, larger classrooms and an open, 5,000-square-foot courtyard between the addition and the existing building. In total, the project included 68,000 square feet of renovations over three floors, including 29 offices, 23 classrooms and a new HVAC system, LED lighting and fire suppression system.



BLACK HAWK COLLEGE STUDENTS CELEBRATE NEW ADDITION

Black Hawk College students started off the school year with new facilities at both campuses. Our students are benefiting from the facility investments as they learn, socialize and study in areas designed with their needs in mind. During the ribbon cutting, BHC president Tim Wynes noted that one thing he kept hearing from students on the first day of class was, "Is this for us?" The answer was, "Yes." "They were just blown away," he said.
