Omar Aceviz

Omar graduated from the Black Hawk College Associate Degree Nursing program in 2015, later earning a bachelor's from the University of Illinois Chicago in 2017 and a master's from the University of St. Francis in 2022.

A Navy veteran, he served during Operation Iraqi Freedom and transitioned to the Navy Reserves, where he was commissioned as a nurse officer. Currently, he works as a family nurse practitioner at Genesis/Mercy One while serving as a Navy lieutenant.

Omar credits Black Hawk College's rigorous nursing program for shaping his career, highlighting its affordability and the expertise of its professors in guiding his professional growth.



David L. Emerick, Jr.

David (Dave) attended Black Hawk College from 1983-85 before earning a political science degree from Northern Illinois University in 1989.

With more than 40 years in banking, he serves as vice president at Blackhawk Bank & Trust and as treasurer for the Black Hawk College Foundation. An active Rotary International leader, he is District #6420 governor and a major donor to the Rotary Foundation.

Dave has taught banking courses at Black Hawk College and is deeply involved in civic organizations, including the Genesis Health Services Foundation and the Rock Island Housing Authority, making a lasting impact on the Quad Cities community.



Molly Tiernan Foley

Molly earned an associate degree from Black Hawk College in 1994 and completed her bachelor's degree at Western Illinois University-Quad Cities.

She is the chief marketing officer and a principal owner at IMEG, leading a team of more than 35 professionals at a national firm with more than 2,600 employees. Molly has driven initiatives in economic development, served as the first female commissioner for the Quad City International Airport, and chaired the Black Hawk College Foundation.

She credits Black Hawk for providing a strong educational foundation and remains an advocate for community colleges' role in building vibrant communities.



Paul "P.J." Foley

P.J. attended Black Hawk College from 1996-99 then earned a bachelor's degree in history and a master's degree in organizational leadership from St. Ambrose University.

He served as Rock Island's Third Ward alderman and held leadership roles at St. Ambrose, including director of government and community affairs. P.J. has served on numerous civic boards, including the Deere Wiman/Butterworth Foundation and Rock Island Community Foundation.

He credits Black Hawk College for sharpening his communication skills and fostering his success in public service and community leadership, which he continues to share with the Quad Cities.



Zenaida Landeros

Zenaida, a lifelong Moline resident and 2004 Black Hawk College graduate, earned her bachelor's degree from Augustana College and an executive master's degree in nonprofit administration from the University of Notre Dame.

She began her career in higher education before leading the Greater Quad Cities Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, where she advanced to executive director. In 2020, Zenaida returned to higher education as leader of the Black Hawk College Foundation, securing grants to expand student access to technology during the pandemic.

She continues to lead with purpose, combining her expertise in nonprofit management, her commitment to community advancement, and her vision for a more equitable future.



Troy Lewis

Troy attended Black Hawk College from 1984-86 before earning a degree in horticulture from Western Illinois University in 1988.

He founded Heritage Landscape Design, which started in his home basement with two employees and \$125,000 in revenue and has grown into a \$6 million business employing 45 people. Troy has mentored many young professionals, instilling a strong work ethic and commitment to teamwork.

He has also contributed to Black Hawk College campus improvement projects and partnered with organizations like the Boys & Girls Club, Make-A-Wish and Special Olympics. A dedicated entrepreneur and community supporter, Troy uses his success to give back, fostering opportunities and growth across the Quad Cities.



Adrian Madunic

Adrian attended Black Hawk College from 1983-85, earning Phi Theta Kappa honors, and later earned a bachelor's degree at Augustana College and a master's degree at Marquette University.

He worked for the Croatian government during its independence movement, overseeing diplomatic protocols and aiding U.S. recognition of Croatia. Adrian spent more than a decade at Black Hawk College, directing programs including the International Trade Center and Small Business Development Center.

He later worked for U.S. Rep. Bobby Schilling and Illinois Comptroller Judy Baar Topinka. Since 2016, Adrian has been with the Illinois Department of Commerce, supporting small businesses and managing programs in northwest Illinois.



Diann Moore

A Moline native and Moline High School graduate, Diann earned her Associate in Arts from Black Hawk College in 1965 and a bachelor's in education from Northern Illinois University in 1967.

She taught history for 17 years and worked at Moline High School as a computer specialist aide until 2021. A passionate historian, Diann co-founded the Moline Preservation Society in 1986, helping save historic Moline landmarks.

She served on the Moline Historic Preservation Commission, authored two books on local history, and actively supports preservation efforts. Diann has also volunteered with the Quad City Symphony Orchestra Junior Board and the Moline Junior Service League.

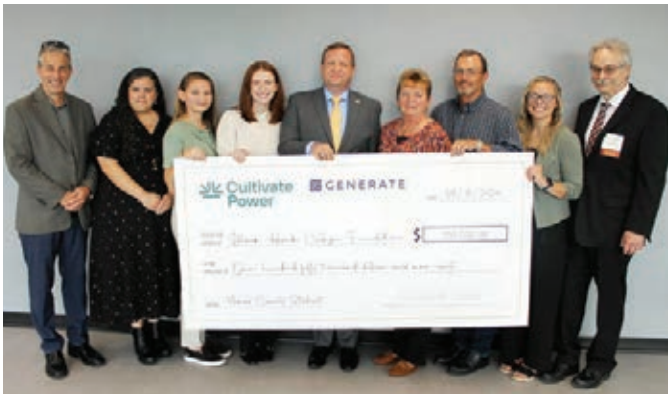
Norbert Barwasser Memorial Scholarship

Cultivate Power & Generate Capital Scholarship

Black Hawk College students from Mercer County will benefit from a new scholarship created by a \$150,000 pledge from Cultivate Power, a solar farm development company, and Generate Capital, a sustainable investment and operating company.

“When completed, the Goldenrod Solar Project will provide access to solar energy for Mercer County area businesses and residents, and this scholarship is an opportunity for us to support the community in another way,” said Kiera Gavin, senior development manager for Cultivate Power.

Earlier this year, Cultivate Power donated \$10,000 to endow a new Goldenrod Solar Scholarship for students at the college’s Quad-Cities Campus. Next year, an endowment will be established for students at the college’s East Campus. In addition, Cultivate Power donated \$2,500

so two students could each receive a scholarship of \$1,250 for Fall 2024.

The recipients were selected based on their academic performance, financial need, and their commitment to their chosen field of study.

The first recipients, Sandra Avila of Viola and Veronica Moffitt of Aledo, are shining examples of the scholarship’s impact. Moffitt, a Quad-Cities Campus student, plans to pursue a bachelor’s degree and work in health care. “I want to use the scholarship to further my education and help the communities around us,” she wrote. Avila, an East Campus student, plans to earn a bachelor’s degree and work in agriculture. “I had really good role models,” she shared. “I plan on making my mentors and parents proud.”

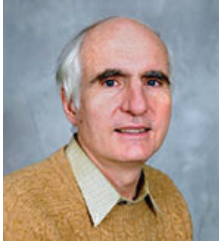
“We are thrilled to partner with Cultivate Power and Generate Capital in providing this transformative scholarship for Mercer County students,” Dr. Jeremy Thomas, president of Black Hawk College. “Thanks to their generous gift, students will have greater access to higher education at both our Quad-Cities and East campuses,” he said.

The remainder of the \$150,000 donation, a testament to the long-term commitment of Cultivate Power and Generate Capital, will be donated over 12 years to the college’s two foundations. “We recognize many students from Mercer County attend both Black Hawk College campuses to further their education, and we are excited to be supporting students on that journey,” Gavin said.





Dr. William Hampes honors his family's legacy



In the early 1900s, in a mountain village in Greece, a young Panagiotis Gatsos dreamed of becoming a teacher. Unfortunately, family circumstances prevented him from attending university and achieving his goal. More than a century later, his

grandson, Dr. William "Bill" Hampes, is helping students pursue their educational dreams at Black Hawk College.

Dr. Hampes recently expanded the endowed scholarship he established in 2020 in memory of his parents.

"I established and named the scholarship to honor my parents who supported my education and that of my sister, Mary Lou, and to pass on that support to those at BHC who need it the most," Dr. Hampes said.

He earned a bachelor's degree and master's degree in psychology, followed by a Ph.D. in experimental psychology. He made a lasting impact as a professor at Black Hawk College from 1989 to 2014 and continues to inspire students as a part-time tutor in retirement.

Mary Lou Hampes Schoenegge taught for 38 years in Chicago Public Schools.

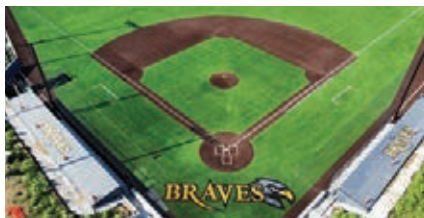

Prairieland Hospice Foundation creates scholarship

The Prairieland Hospice Foundation donated \$10,000 to the Black Hawk College Foundation to establish an annual scholarship benefiting four nursing students and one Emergency Medical Services (EMS) student. Recipients each received \$500 for the 2024-25 school year.

Based in Galesburg, the Prairieland Hospice Foundation collaborates with Compassus, a provider of hospice services to residents in Galesburg and Moline.

“We want to do something for the community,” said Dr. Jim Cecil, a retired physician and president of the Prairieland Hospice Foundation. “Education is the key. I’m a great believer in education.”

who are training to become the skilled and compassionate caregivers the community needs.

“We are deeply grateful to Prairieland Hospice Foundation of Galesburg for investing in our nursing and EMS students,” she said. “Because of Prairieland’s help, these students can focus fully on their education and future careers in health care.”

Scholarship recipient Tyler Kline of Colona, an Emergency Medical Services student, has volunteered with two rural fire departments in addition to working full-time for an ambulance service. “Since I was a little kid, I have always been attracted





A scholarship inspired by a friend's mother



Jim Deitz was inspired by Dee Canfield, the mother of one of his childhood friends. As a young, divorced mother of two, Canfield began taking classes at Black Hawk College in 1968.

Over the next 56 years, Canfield completed two years of Black Hawk College classes, earned a bachelor's degree and a master's degree, provided braille and talking book service to disabled persons, worked for one academic and three public libraries, then began a second career teaching English to immigrants.

In honor of her accomplishments, Jim Deitz established the Dietz Foundation Dee Canfield Scholarship through the Black Hawk College Foundation.

"I think far too many people donate to places like the Ivy League when you can get a good education at local places like Black Hawk College," he said.

"My foundation aims to help people get involved in education, and Mrs. Canfield was someone who went back to college as an adult and a parent," Dietz said.

After retiring from her library career, Canfield returned to Black Hawk College and spent nine years teaching English as a Second Language classes.



"This was work that brought me great fulfillment and joy. I felt this was my true life's calling," Dee said.

Because of her first-hand experience, Canfield understands nontraditional students' challenges. Her educational

path as an adult learner inspired Dietz to help those students with the Black Hawk College scholarship. "If I can help a nontraditional student, that's great. It will always make me think of Mrs. Canfield," Dietz said.

Dietz himself is an educator and college coach, and helping others go into education is important to him.

"I'm deeply honored to be associated with Jim's scholarship that will provide nontraditional students with encouragement and assistance," she said. "The education I received at Black Hawk College was of the highest caliber and I've always been proud of my association with Black Hawk, both as a student and later as a teacher."

"Dee exemplifies the transformative power of education, demonstrating how determination and opportunity can create a brighter future," said Zenaida Landeros, executive director of the Black Hawk College Foundation.

"We are grateful that this scholarship extends that promise, providing equitable opportunities for our students at different stages of life to pursue their dreams and achieve their goals," Landeros said.

About Black Hawk College



Improving lives through learning

Black Hawk College began as Moline Community College in 1946, offering education to World War II veterans. It became Black Hawk College in 1961, the first county-wide junior college in Illinois, and joined the state's higher education system in 1965. The college expanded to southeastern communities, opening the East Campus in 1971.

Today, operated as one college with two campuses and several outreach sites, Black Hawk College offers both career and transfer programs and a wide range of special purpose and community outreach programs.

Black Hawk College serves more people than any other institution of higher education in the Quad-Cities region.
